

What We Do

Kingston Economic Development strives to create sustainable economic growth, fostering a vibrant and resilient local economy that is ready to meet the challenges and seize the opportunities of an ever-changing economic landscape.

By leveraging Kingston's competitive advantage and identifying strategic industries, we secure government funding to deliver targeted programs supporting existing businesses, fostering startups and entrepreneurship, facilitating workshops and business events, and attracting new companies.

Altogether, these initiatives incentivize new job creation and improve the quality of life of current and future residents of our community.

Business Support

We operate one of Ontario's 54 Small Business Enterprise Centres, providing free and confidential consultations to local companies of any size and at every stage. We assist with advice on starting, growing or selling a business. Our experienced and multilingual team of advisors is the key to accessing the resources, programs, services, and connections that help businesses reach the next level.

Workshop & Business Events

Throughout 2024, we facilitated over 100 workshops and business events, attracting over 2,300 participants.

Based on the most frequent challenges identified in consultations, we designed and delivered free workshops in collaboration with local experts and partner organizations. Covering a wide range of skills, we launched the Signature Sessions, Not-For-Profit Academy, Marketing Series, Financial Series, and the Al Series.

To foster collaboration and expand networks of Kingston's professionals, we organize business events such as the Annual Kingston Business Forecast Lunch, Kingston Young Professionals networking events and 40 Under 40 Awards, Newcomer Entrepreneur Awards, Welcome Nights, Women in Science, Technology, Engineering, Art, and Mathematics, among others.

Business Programs

We deliver business programs to incentivize growth and accelerate commercialization. The programs are composed of training, mentorship, and funding components and offered throughout the year, with different intake dates and eligibility criteria. Programs like Summer Company and Starter Company Plus have helped entrepreneurs launch over 500 businesses in Kingston & area over the last 10 years. Our Ask the Expert program connects business owners with expert advice in areas like legal, human resources, sales, patents, and financial management. The Business Grant Writing support assists businesses in applying to federal and provincial programs. The HI-YGK program supports innovative life sciences companies in growing and accelerating commercialization.

Investment Attraction

We actively engage with domestic and global businesses to seek companies that complement Kingston's values and strengths. We prioritize attracting companies in our strategic sectors, Sustainable Manufacturing and Life Sciences. Our investment managers actively pursue new leads through direct outreach, attending trade shows, Canada Global Affairs investment and innovation roadshows, and coordinating site visits for investors.















2024 Impact

Kingston Economic Development's commitment to fostering a city where businesses, startups, and investments thrive is evident in our 2024 performance.

We have continued to play a key role in the year-over-year growth of Kingston's diverse and innovative ecosystem. The Corporation recorded significant gains in investment outreach, new investment leads generation, business support inquiries and consultations, and workshops and events attendees.

Competitive Advantage

Kingston is well-positioned for success thanks to its thriving business ecosystem of companies, entrepreneurs and innovators, strategic location, and access to talent.

Innovation

Ranking number one in industrial and academic research and development, Kingston is home to more than 45 Canadian Research Chairs and more than 30 research laboratories, with dedicated pathways for innovation, from technology validation to commercialization.

Talent

According to Statistics Canada, Kingston has the smartest workforce in Canada, with the most PhD graduates. Companies benefit from a continuous stream of world-class talent from Kingston's three post-secondary institutions.

Access to Markets

Strategically positioned within a three-hour drive of Toronto, Montreal, and Ottawa, Kingston has access to over 14.5 million people, representing the largest population base of all Canadian Census Metropolitan Areas. Within an eight-hour drive, Kingston has access to the third-largest GDP concentration in North America.

Trade Agreements

Canada's 15 trade agreements provide businesses with privileged market access to a diverse global landscape that encompasses over 50 countries. These strategic partnerships connect Kingston's enterprises to approximately 1.7 billion potential consumers worldwide, representing combined economies valued at over US\$50 trillion.

Employment Lands

Kingston is home to several serviced and zoned business parks designed for light industrial development, offering space for modern infrastructure and convenient access to major transportation routes. With available employment lands and capacity for expansion, the city is well-positioned to attract new investment and support the growth of existing businesses.

Priority Sectors

In creating Kingston's Integrated Economic Development Strategy, the Corporation, in partnership with the City of Kingston, identified and set out to develop two strategic clusters in sustainable manufacturing and health innovation.

Sustainable Manufacturing

Kingston is a leader in sustainable manufacturing in Ontario and is home to multinational corporations such as INVISTA, Novelis, DuPont, Celanese, Frulact, Canada Royal Milk, alongside many successful Kingston-based companies.

Represented by over 100 companies with more than 5,000 workers, Kingston's sustainable manufacturing sector is recognized for its innovative and leading technology. Kingston's manufacturing and R&D ecosystem supports the development and production of advanced materials, green chemicals, polymers, clean technology, battery materials and food processing.

Kingston's manufacturing industries support aluminum production (Novelis), chemical products (DuPont), integrated fibre, resin and intermediates (INVISTA), critical minerals and rare earth elements (REE) (Cyclic Materials, Ucore, and Green Graphite Technologies).

Companies in Kingston take advantage of immediate access to rapid and reliable logistics services. National and international transportation, distribution, and warehousing services are already set up in the city (Prologix, Vitran Express, SCI Distribution), with access to a variety of shipping and travel services.

Health Innovation & Life Sciences

Kingston's world-renowned research institutions are globally recognized and combined with the local talent and strong entrepreneur ecosystem, Kingston is positioned as a leader in health and life sciences innovation.

Kingston's single cohesive and integrated healthcare network, considered to be a rapid-learning health system by partners, provides a unique opportunity for businesses and researchers. Healthcare and life sciences, as well as professional, scientific and technical services, are the fastest-growing employment sectors in the city, and already boasts over 14,000 workers.

This landscape allows for a competitive environment in the life sciences field, rich with start-ups and private research companies. Kingston is home to multinational corporations and entrepreneurs that strive to revolutionize medical technologies, digital health, advanced cell and gene therapies, and biopharmaceutical research to develop applications for complex health solutions.

The health innovation research hubs located in Kingston are future-centered and offer a diverse range of health solutions that are globally focused on supporting public and private sector businesses.

Supporting Existing Businesses

Kingston Economic Development works closely with local employers to support business retention and expansion.

Throughout 2024, we continued connecting Kingston-based businesses with diverse growth programs offered by government and industry partners. We actively supported and encouraged businesses in their application processes, ensuring they could access these valuable opportunities. We were able to facilitate a number of large events and programs that provided funding, education and networking opportunities to businesses in our area.

Digital Main Street

In terms of funding support, Kingston Economic Development successfully concluded Digital Mainstreet, a \$2,500 microgrant program sponsored by the Provincial Government. Over the last two years of the program, more than 400 local businesses were supported with over \$500,000 in funding for their digital implementations.

Canada Digital Adoption Program (CDAP)

The Canada Digital Adoption Program (CDAP) continued in 2024 and provided \$2,400 microgrants and digital advice to businesses in Kingston, Gananoque, Frontenac County and Lennox & Addington. In partnership with KEYS, the Corporation was able to leverage funding from the Federal Government to assist businesses within the catchment area with projects related to their e-commerce strategies and deployment of new digital technologies. To date, the program has employed 24 youth advisors and worked with more than 1,000 businesses. Kingston Economic Development was the only economic development office in Canada to manage the entire program in-house.

Kingston Business Leaders' Summit

Co-hosted by the Royal Bank of Canada (RBC) and proudly sponsored by the Business Development Bank of Canada, Kingston Economic Development hosted the Kingston Business Leaders' Summit at Canada Royal Milk. The event featured engaging panel discussions led by industry experts on key topics such as International Trade, Cybersecurity, and Business Transition. RBC economist Carrie Freestone delivered the keynote presentation, offering analysis on consumer spending, labour markets, GDP, and inflation. The Summit provided a valuable forum for business leaders to explore current challenges and opportunities in today's economy.



Kingston Business Funding Announcements

A number of Kingston businesses were able to access Provincial and Federal funding to support their commercialization, R&D and expansion plans.

- // Cancoil received \$2.5M from Eastern Ontario Development Fund to support their expansion.
- // IPG Photonics received \$1.5M from Eastern Ontario Development Fund for their new facility at Cataraqui Estates Business Park.
- // Cyclic Materials received \$4.9M from Natural Resources Canada Funding.
- // Green Graphite Technologies received \$3.5M from Natural Resources Canada Funding.
- // Ucore Rare Metals Inc. received \$4.2 million in funding from Natural Resources Canada to scale up commercialization. The Company was also awarded \$500,000 in funding by the Ontario Critical Minerals Innovation Fund.
- // Performance Plants Inc. (PPI) announced a \$2.3 million investment through the AgriScience Program under the Sustainable Canadian Agricultural Partnership.
- // GreenCentre Canada secured \$2 million in federal funding to continue delivering their Advance-ON program.

Cyclic Materials' Hub 100

Cyclic Materials opened its Hub100 plant in Kingston, a facility designed to recycle 100 tonnes of magnetic material annually using its REEPure™ technology. This facility is the first to produce recycled Mixed Rare Earth Oxide (rMREO) in North America. Established in 2021 in Kingston, Ontario, Cyclic Materials is on a mission to create a circular supply chain for rare earth elements and other materials critical to electrification and the energy transition.

IDEXX Tecta New Manufacturing Space

IDEXX Tecta opened a new manufacturing space in Kingston's west end, the Business Unit Centre of Excellence, for their automated water microbiology testing devices. Since 2003, TECTA-PDS has developed an effective and reliable automated water testing solution and has grown to expand its customer base in more than 50 countries.

Sensient Colors Canada Automation investment

Sensient Colors Canada announced a \$500,000 investment in automation equipment, boosting production capacity by 25% to meet the rising demand for natural food colours in North America while also increasing its Kingston operations and employee base.

Centre for Psychedelics Health & Research

Providence Care Hospital and Queen's University launched the Centre for Psychedelics Health and Research, focused on exploring the therapeutic potential of psychedelics such as psilocybin, LSD, and ketamine to support mental health treatments. The Centre also committed to training healthcare professionals and hosting community workshops to reduce the stigma associated with psychedelic therapies.

Octane Medical Acquires B. Braun's Global Orthobiologics Business

Octane Medical Group, through its new venture
Octane Biotherapeutics (BioTx), has acquired 100%
shares of the global orthobiologics business from
its long-term partner B. Braun. The acquisition,
consisting of the two companies TETEC AG in
Germany and Aesculap Biologics, LLC. in the United
States, establishes Octane as an international
leader in regenerative medicine. Kingston business

Business Forecast Lunch

Kingston Economic Development Corporation, in partnership with The Smith School of Business at Queen's University, revived the annual Business Forecast Lunch at the Kingston Market Square Hotel for its 37th edition in 2024. The event featured expert insights from economists Dr. Elspeth Murray, Dr. David Detomasi, and Dr. Tracy Jenkin, who shared regional, national, and global economic forecasts. Kingston Economic Development looks forward to continuing this annual event in the years ahead.

EDCO's Queen's Park Day

The Corporation represented Kingston at the Economic Developers Council of Ontario's Queen's Park Day, where staff met with elected officials to discuss key economic development priorities. Conversations focused on supporting small businesses and advancing large-scale manufacturing strategies, with the shared goal of enhancing economic resilience and long-term sustainability.

Project Arrow

In collaboration with the Automotive Parts
Manufacturers' Association (APMA), Kingston
Economic Development showcased Canada's first
100% Canadian-made electric vehicle, Project
Arrow, in Springer Market Square. In attendance,
representatives from local companies highlighted
their roles in the EV sector.

Ministry of Economic Development, Job Creation and Trade

Kingston Economic Development welcomed the Honourable Victor Fedeli, Minister of Economic Development, Job Creation and Trade, to the city. During his visit, Minister Fedeli toured local industry leaders, including Cyclic Materials' "Hub100" facility, IPG Photonics Inc., and Cancoil Thermal Corporation. The visit highlighted Kingston's leadership in advanced manufacturing and sustainable technologies.

On a separate visit, we hosted Assistant Deputy Minister Clara Chan, from the Ministry of Economic Development, Job Creation and Trade, the minister toured, SENS Cafe and manufacturer IPG Photonics Inc., to exemplify Kingston's broad business landscape.



Start-ups & Entrepreneurship

Kingston Economic Development assists entrepreneurs by providing the support, training and resources they need to successfully start their businesses.

Connecting individuals with advice, workshops and funding opportunities helps to ensure that they begin their business venture on the right path.

The Corporation fosters ecosystems of like-minded entrepreneurs to advance sector development with a collective goal of creating an environment where potential and existing entrepreneurs can thrive.

Top Small City in Canada for its Startup Ecosystem

For the third consecutive year, Kingston has maintained its rank as the top small city (100,000 – 500,000 population) in Canada for its startup ecosystem. Overall, Kingston secured an impressive position, ranking ninth among all Canadian cities, and moved three points up globally to rank 179th in the prestigious StartupBlink's Global Startup

Summer Company

Since 2001, Kingston Economic Development has delivered the provincially funded Summer Company program for high school and postsecondary students. In 2024, 12 local students launched business ventures in sectors such as agriculture, contract services, and the creative industries. Each participant received a \$3,000 grant to start their business, along with hands-on mentoring and training from local business leaders. The young entrepreneurs participated in a one-week virtual business bootcamp, gaining valuable insights into launching and sustaining a startup, developing business plans, and managing cash flow projections.

Starter Company Plus

Kingston Economic Development concluded another year with the successful delivery of the Starter Company Plus program, supporting successful entrepreneurs with a total of \$78,000 in startup funding. Designed to support new and early-stage entrepreneurs, the program offers business training, personalized mentorship, and a microgrant of up to \$5,000. Attraction & Aftercare

Kingston Economic Development actively pursues investment opportunities through direct outreach, strategic partnerships and international engagement activities with the objective of attracting companies to Kingston.

Our approach to investment attraction is centred on fostering a business-friendly environment through strong partnerships and a concierge support service. Through our collaborations with Global Affairs Canada, international embassies, and strategic partnerships, we continue to showcase Kingston on an international level as an attractive investment destination. Locally, our engagement with all levels of government, industry organizations and academia, collectively provide a cohesive network to support companies to establish a Kingston site and their ongoing growth opportunities.

Welcome UNDO

UNDO Carbon, a UK-based company focused on carbon removal from the atmosphere by the use of enhanced rock weathering (ERW), launched operations in Kingston with local mining partner Canadian Wollastonite. UNDO leverages the environmental benefits of wollastonite—a calcium silicate mineral capable of permanently removing carbon from the atmosphere by spreading the mineral in agricultural land. During the launch ceremony, UNDO announced a new agreement with Microsoft to tackle the permanent removal of 15,000 tonnes of carbon from the atmosphere, further support research into ERW, and scale the company's environmental impact.

French Embassy Economic Committee Retreat

We had the privilege of welcoming His Excellency Mr. Michel Miraillet, French Ambassador to Canada, and the Canadian Chapter of the French International Trade Advisors (CCEF) in Kingston during their 2024 Economic Committee Retreat. The delegation included C-suite executives from industries such as aerospace, textiles, mining, pharmaceuticals, water treatment, Information and Communication Technology (ICT), and banking.

Opportunities in Europe for Eastern Ontario Seminar

In partnership with Queen's University, the Corporation hosted the Consulate Generals of Hungary, Austria, the Czech Republic, and the Polish Investment & Trade Agency (PAIH) for the Opportunities in Europe for Eastern Ontario Seminar. The Seminar facilitated one-on-one meetings between country representatives and Kingston business owners seeking to trade and expand into international markets, featuring presentations on the country's priority sectors.

Kingston-Syracuse Pathway Conference and Pitch Competition

We hosted the 3rd annual Kingston-Syracuse
Pathway Conference in 2024, with the theme of
Advancing Health and Economic Development
through Research and Innovation. Colleagues from
both sides of the border gathered to exchange ideas
and opportunities in the Health Innovation and life

sciences space. The Conference featured expert panels by local industry professionals and the annual Kingston-Syracuse Pathway Pitch Competition, with Kingston-based SMART Biomedical winning for their innovative and lifesaving chest tube insertion device.

Kingston-Scottsdale Sister Cities

To mark the 30th anniversary of the Kingston-Scottsdale Sister City relationship, a delegation from Kingston, including members from the City of Kingston, Kingston Economic Development, Providence Care, and Queen's University SEAMO, travelled to Scottsdale, Arizona. Hosted by Scottsdale's Mayor Ortega, the delegation explored health innovation partnerships with Arizona State University and the Mayo Clinic.

Lead Generation

Through our in-house lead generation specialist, we identified and contacted over 800 companies with the objective to present Kingston's business case and discuss company growth plans. This position researches and identifies companies that are complementary to our business community, align with priority sectors and address supply chain opportunities.

Tradeshows

The team attended a number of targeted industry tradeshows alongside key partners, Global Affairs Canada, Invest in Canada and Invest Ontario, to meet with companies interested in establishing a presence in North America to present the Kingston business case. These events resulted in a number of well-established leads and opportunities and served as a valuable platform to showcase Kingston's competitive advantages and assets to international companies.

Of note, Kingston has been invited to participate in the Global Affairs Roadshow delegations along with the largest urban cities in Canada to meet directly with companies seeking investment in Canada. The roadshow delegations in addition to other signature trade events including BIO International Convention, BIO Europe, and the Battery Show and have provided in market representation in strategic markets poised for growth.

Kingston-Greater Sudbury Critical Minerals Alliance

The Kingston Economic Development Corporation and the Greater Sudbury Development Corporation announced a new alliance at the BEV In-Depth:

Mines to Mobility Conference in 2024. The economic development agencies entered a memorandum of Understanding, forming the Kingston–Greater Sudbury Critical Minerals Alliance to foster innovation and enhance collaboration by connecting mines, clean-tech companies, and mining processing technologies across the value chain.
